

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



Objectives

- Increasing old-age is combined with more frequent and longer phases of being in need of care
- Most families will have to cope with the situation that their ageing relatives will become dependent
- Long-term-care for several years as a consequence
- European policy: to enable older people to remain at home as long as possible...

Objectives

... therefore there is a need for

- More support by family carers
- More alternative care arrangements, e.g. shared households for disabled or demented persons
- Better training and coping skills

and

 The risk for family carers of becoming those in need of care has to be reduced



Aims

- To review the situation of family carers of dependent older people in relation to the
 - existence,
 - familiarity,
 - availability,
 - use and acceptability of supporting services.
- To provide policy recommendations for supporting a partnership approach between family carers, professional providers and the cared-for older people





Two major parts of EUROFAMCARE:

- Pan-European background knowledge focussing on the situation of family carers at the political level and using secondary analyses
- In-depths studies in the six core countries focussing on the empirical situation of family carers (6,000 interviews) and their cared-for

Background Reports

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- NABARE reports: Same structure in all 23 reports following a Standardised Evaluation Protocol showing the issue of family care in every country Methodology: Content- and Secondary Analysis
- PEUBARE: Pan-European synopsis of the European situation of family carers with respect to similarities and differences between the countries.

European Policy Dimension

- To give feedback to the EUROFAMCARE partners with European level background information
- To disseminate the results of EUROFAMCARE to key policy actors and NGOs on the European level
- To stimulate the policy agenda with regard to the existence, familiarity, availability, use and acceptability of services to support family carers



Six-Countries-Study

In-depth studies in the 6 countries: Germany, Greece, Italy, Poland, Sweden and UK

- Face to face interviews using a Joint Family Care Assessment (CAT) with 1,000 carers per country providing 4 or more hours of personal care/support per week to an elderly relative (65+) in any need of support
- Follow-up survey 12 months later
- Service provider study

Data analysis at national and European levels

Content of the CAT

- 1. Older persons' demographic and background characteristics
- 2. Older persons' disabilities and needs
- 3. Carers' demographic and background characteristics
- 4. Carers' caregiving situations
- 5. Carers' quality of life
- 6. Financial circumstances
- 7. Service Use

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- 8. Characteristics and quality of services
- 9. Country specific questions (e.g. LTCI in Germany)



Socio-economic Evaluation

A socio-economic evaluation on the basis of the National Surveys and the pan-European background information addresses

- the socio-economic situation of carers,
- the economic impact of family caregiving for society and for carers
- the effectiveness of services for carers.



Research Action - REACT

- To contact a network of service providers and privileged witnesses to discuss study results
- To better understand the gap between perceived needs and "Political Reality"
- To contribute to a change of attitudes / concepts / behaviours
- To provide guidelines for innovation, good practice etc.
